Dear Friends of Heartbeet,

This is the hardest letter I have ever written in the history of Heartbeet. I have deliberated and struggled over how to bring the breadth and depth of our community's experience of the last few weeks. I am heartbroken to share that our colleague, dear friend, chosen family and true community member Jared Shaffer passed away suddenly on April 18th. How can words express the profound feelings that accompany this loss?

Jared joined Heartbeet eight years ago, sharing his love of life with all he knew, and celebrating the seasons through the rhythm of farming and the work of large machinery. He had an overarching understanding of community, family and friendship. Jared loved and engaged in life with gentleness and humor. He was cheeky, silly and always interested.

Jared brought to the farm an enthusiasm for land work, diving into farming with a love that was infectious, bringing joy to even the most monotonous jobs. He always knew when the town snow plow, excavator, and builders with their trucks were coming, and was the first to let the community know when it was time to get the hay-wagons ready. He was a true friend to all those who took the time to get to know him, and he offered his warmth and humor in abundance. In the few weeks since his passing letters filled with appreciation and care have poured into Heartbeet from all over the world, written by people who loved Jared's impact on Heartbeet is unmistakable-- he helped us build concepts of inclusion around land work and animal care. In honor of Jared's love and dedication to the farm we will be dedicating the Heartbeet barn to Jared during our Friends and Family Day on June 17th.

In the heart of this long winter, Heartbeet said farewell to Mandy as her life took her back to her home town—she was a joy to have in the community with her consistent sense of humor. Many friendships were established that I am sure will be fruitful into the future! We also sent off our dear family Onat and David in January, and wished them best of luck on their next adventures. They have moved to the Hudson Valley and Camphill Ghent. A highlight was Onat's goodbye birthday where the whole community gathered to share appreciation, gifts and cheesecake—what a fabulous night to remember! We also said goodbye to Emily, Joseph, Isaac, and Thomas Papas as their life path took them adventuring to new horizons.

With all the goodbyes, we have also been welcoming in new faces—Marissa Huppe joined our administrative team



Aster—The Heartbeet Yurt—\$25,000

Leigh invited me to write a short article about my experiences in Heartbeet. I told her I would be happy to do that. Best of all, she has given me the opportunity to thank Heartbeet for the chance of living and working in the community for three and a half wonderful years. Some might say, "naturally," your daughter (Hannah), son-in-law and grandchildren live there. But my experience in Heartbeet is more than about my family.

Heartbeet was my fourth Camphill community to live in over the last forty-three years. Previously, I lived in Camphill Village Kimberton Hills, Camphill Special School and Camphill Communities California. However, Heartbeet is the only truly rural community setting that I have ever lived in. I am so glad to have had the experience of the extraordinary beauty of the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont. I tell people that if you want to go back in time to feel what a rural setting felt like fifty or a hundred years ago,

then go to Heartbeet. One of the most precious experiences I had at Heartbeet was through the nature there. I was reunited with my nine-year-old self who spent summers in Yuba City, California on my grandparents' or chard. I also told my friends that at Heartbeet you can walk out and breathe in the air and it feels like a meal.

Readers may not know that my husband, Onat, and I were the first teachers from Beaver Run (Camphill Special School in Pennsylvania) to take a seniors' group to Heartbeet. The first visit was in the summer of 2002. Jonathan set up a wonderful, big (really big!) tent on the White Pine lawn that served as our dining hall. There was a stove, a kitchen sink and countertops all set up, and two or three picnic tables. Also, he set up an outdoor shower near White Pine. We all slept in tents on the lawn. That first group included Sean, Connor and Thomas!

One of my highlights of living in Heartbeet is that I was able to be part of the planning of and preparations for the new Community Center. What an honor. Also, I was able to install a garden and orchard between the Cottage and Amber Rose. Leaving gardens behind me is always one of my favorite Camphill things. By the way, up on the hillside above the Cottage and Amber Rose, I am still going to finish sculpting out of cement a gnome statue. You can see the foundation that I poured last summer; it is near the bench.

Lastly, I made so many good friends in Heartbeet, some of whom hopefully will come and visit Onat and me in our new home in northern New York, near the four Camphill places in Columbia County, close to Albany. Our door will always be open.

What is one regret? I hoped to see the woods next to the Cottage that go down to the creek become a park. I hope this still happens!
